KSCP December 2013 Curriculum: Dark and Light (Family Winter Traditions)

Big Concepts:

- 1. We all have culture and tradition
- 2. Families celebrate in their own special ways
- 3. Many winter traditions involve special lights that light up the darkness of winter

Literacy:

- Songs and fingerplays: "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star," "5 brown buns," "Go to Sleep (movement song)," This Little Light of Mine (chorus),
- Books: Light the Lights, Gingerbread Boy, Gingerbread Baby, Goodnight Moon, The House in the Night
- Poems: "My Shadow," "Jack Be Nimble,"
- Shadow Puppet Theater Stories
- Goodnight Moon extension Home Center clothesline to pair and pin mittens and socks; Goodnight Moon matching game

Mathematics:

- Pattern block "stars"
- Sorting: electric lights vs. non-electric lights, shiny vs. dull

Art/Science:

- Sensory Table Explorations with black beans and silver "treasures," making flubber (exploring moving from a liquid to a solid state)
- Making Shadow Puppets and exploring shadow in the puppet theater
- Spiced Play dough with rolling pins, muffin tins, and cookie cutters
- Solstice Lanterns
- Flashlights and colored cellophane (transparent vs. opaque, light and color)
- Contact paper light collage
- Black paper with white crayon and oil pastels
- Penny shining

Gross Motor Games:

- "Jack Be Nimble" candlestick jumping
- Flashlight tag
- Red Light/Green Light

Other Fun:

- Creating caves and cozy dark spaces forts, hide and seek
- Pajama Week (December 16th 20th)
